A WORD FROM THE PRESIDENT

As you read this, the primary is all but over, with just the actual primary voting day yet to be held. Many Republicans will lose, but hopefully, the best will have risen to the top and in the fall, we will have Republican candidates "creaming" the competition. (Sorry!)

But there is an important issue to remember: We must unify behind the Republican candidates in order to win. As we heard in Washington, DC, this spring: Republicans who stay home elect Democrats. But even before the November 8th election, we must work to ensure our candidates are elected.

First, let's get people registered to vote. Many of you have been working on voter registration, and we need to keep on that. We have more than 8,500 new residents in Nevada to register. It's not hard work, but it's tedious and can be time-consuming. Keeping our eyes on the goal

makes it worth our while.

Second, let's get out the vote. We have time for clubs to initiate a plan to ferry seniors and others who don't have transportation to the polls. The early voting period gives us plenty of time to coordinate this effort. Put up notices in senior centers and senior housing. Notices in libraries and grocery stores and other places where people gather. Republicans do well at GOTV efforts in off-year elections — let's ensure that we out-vote the Democrats in the general election this year!

Third, be sure to turn out for Rosie. The NFRW's traveling bus is making a huge impact throughout the country. We don't have dates yet for her sojourn through Nevada, but her arrival gives us a wonderful opportunity to be visible in the days leading up to the election.

Keep up the good work, keep positive, and let's turn our country around!



FINANCIAL CORNER

TO COMP OR NOT TO COMP?

As we all know, politicians love to speak. Our club meetings are a perfect forum for them. However, if a state or local candidate is a guest speaker at an NvFRW club meeting and if any part of their speech is "designed to affect the outcome" of an election (see NRS294A.225) the candidate should pay for their admittance. For example, a simple statement of "vote for me" qualifies as speech designed to affect the outcome of an election.

If the club decides to give the candidate complimentary admittance, then that is considered an "in kind" donation and the club must register with the Secretary of State and report the "in kind" donation.

If your club is a registered with the Secretary of State as a PAC, then the reporting would be included on the C&E report according to the rules of compliance.

Where does the money come from and where does it go? How many times have we asked ourselves that question when it comes to politics? Well, it's time to pass along the key to the answers just in case you have been in the dark for years like me. The secret word is AURORA.

AURORA is a database of contributions and expenses for political candidates and groups the Nevada Secretary of State maintains. With this being an election year, a filing was due on May 24th and can be reviewed at:

In order to search, select the TYPE: individual or group (at the left of the page), then on the right side of the page type in the individual or party name. It is not necessary to fill in any other information.


Click on SEARCH and you should then see a page listing the individual or group name. Click on the name at the left and on the next page click on CE Report 1 on the right side of the page. This will allow you to review the first filling for 2016. This includes January 1, 2016 through May 20, 2016. If you have any questions please feel free to contact me.

ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS

I was sure that, by now, the 2016-17 Achievement Awards guidelines would be available, but it was not to be. I received an email from NFRW's Liz Matro explaining that: "We are so sorry for the delay! We had to push publishing the Achievement Awards back from May 1st to late spring. We will announce when they are available in the Capital Connection!" So, in the meantime, please continue to use the 2014-15 guidelines.

Your club can earn plenty of Achievement Awards points by retaining current members and recruiting new ones. Here are a few tips to accomplish these objectives:

- **Meeting notices:** Send meeting notices (by email, if possible) to all members, associates, club friends, government teachers in your local high school(s) and college(s), senior center(s), churches and service club(s).
- **Membership brochures/applications:** Be sure club members have membership brochures/applications. You never know when you might need one. This year, in particular, there is tremendous political discourse going on all around us.
- **Recruiting:** Caroline Smith, our 2nd Vice President/Membership, came up with a great idea. She created an attractive sheet that says, "Would you like to join a dynamic Republican Women's Club?" Caroline passed these around at the Nevada State Convention and got several pages of contact information. Pass a sheet like this around at your Central Committee meetings and other meetings/events you and your club members participate in. See Page 11 for a ready to use sign-up sheet you can copy.
- **Retention:** The key to membership retention is for guests and new members to feel welcomed and needed. Create a welcoming committee whose responsibility is to greet people when they arrive. New people should be escorted to a table and introduced to club members.

Political Education Memorial Fund (PEM)

PEM is one of the NvFRW's best kept secrets. How many of you are aware that funds are available to those of your members who might need a little financial help to attend a board of directors meeting or a biennial convention? Only a few of you? Well, let me tell you about the Political Education Memorial Fund.

PEM is wholly supported by donations either from clubs that collect birthday dollars at their meetings and/or donate \$100 per year, and from individuals at NvFRW board meetings and conventions via cups placed on the tables. Although memorial donations of \$25 or more can be made in honor of a club member, friend or family member (a page is added to the Memorial Notebook, a thank you note sent to the club or individual and an acknowledgement to the family of the deceased are sent), the last such donation recorded was in 2008. Donations can also be made by leaving a bequest in your will; however, as far as I can tell, no such bequest has ever been made.

PEM grants are restricted to providing financial assistance for travel and/or registration at NvFRW board meetings, conventions, leadership training classes and campaign management school. Applications for a PEM grant must be postmarked no later than one month prior to the event and must be accompanied by a letter from the applicant's club president. The application asks if your club is providing any financial assistance and if not, your application will receive priority over someone else whose club is helping them out. The number and amount of grants awarded is dependent upon how many requests are received and how much money is available in the budget.

The official PEM description on our website contains a statement that "It would be extremely helpful if all club presidents announced the existence of the fund periodically to their members. A small article in a club newsletter is also recommended." I have no problem with anyone using this article as the basis for an article in your club newsletter. I also request that all club presidents make an announcement about PEM now and then, but especially just enough prior to NvFRW events to let your members know about PEM in time to apply for a grant. This is a great way for clubs to get those members on the fence about participating at the state level to a meeting or training session to learn how much fun they will have and how much they will learn.

Since this article was written, the Fernley Republican Women have donated \$25 in memory of Pam Zierenberg, one of its founding members who died from cancer in April 2012 at the age of 62. (- P.G.)

Jo Marshall Memorial Scholarship Fund

The Jo Marshall Memorial Scholarship Fund was created in 2001 in memory of Jo Marshall, a member of the BCRW, serving on their BOD. She was a Past BCRW President. She also served as NvFRW Southern Director. Two \$1,000 scholarships are awarded each year, one to an applicant from northern Nevada and one to a southern Nevada applicant. Students attending the University of Nevada, UNLV, our state community colleges and Nevada State College are eligible to apply.

Funding for these scholarships is provided by the designated annual \$100.00 donations given directly to the scholarship fund by each of our NvFRW clubs.

Each NvFRW club president may submit a maximum of two sponsored applications. All applications must be received by the Jo Marshall Scholarship Chair by September 1, 2016. The scholarships will be awarded on or before October 1, 2016.

Applicant Criteria for Consideration

- Must be a female resident of Nevada and a registered Republican;
- Must be enrolled as a "degree seeking" student in her Junior or Senior year at a Nevada university;
- Must have a minimum GPA of 3.0 and have carried 12 credit hours in the semester prior to September 1, 2016;
- Must be sponsored by a NvFRW Club and have the application signed by the President and/or First Vice President of the sponsoring Club.

Applicant's Responsibilities for Consideration

- Must submit two letters of recommendation from non-relatives;
- Must submit a biographical essay describing a significant achievement and a time when the applicant grew as a person;
- Must submit the most recent official university transcript available and proof of current school registration.

Southern Hills RW Our Very Own GOP Woman of Distinction Lynn Armanino, President



Southern Hills RW in southern Nevada is proud of member Rana Goodman who, on June 1, 2016 was acknowledged as the *Senior Citizen of the Year* by Aging Services Directors Organization (ASDO). Rana is a "champion of Guardianship reform." She became aware of abusive guardians who took advantage of the elderly and learned that the elderly were not protected by the law in Nevada. These guardians may not have even been licensed and no background checks were ever performed.



She protected families where a senior member(s) was actually kidnapped and the family was not allowed contact. Their home and life savings became prey to unscrupulous guardians since the family courts actually ruled against families and protected the private guardians. Rana lobbied long and hard to get the Nevada 2015 78th Legislative Session to pass Senate Bill 262 "which repealed the law that prohibited anyone not living in Nevada from serving as a guardian and Assembly Bill 325 which required the licensing of the 'professional guardianship industry.'" Present were local CBS KLAS-TV CBS 8; local ABC KTNV-TV Ch. 13; Radio KXNT News/Talk Radio 840 AM with Alan Stock as the moderator; the Las Vegas Sun; the Associated Press; and, we even had a student from UNLV who covered the event for her journalism class.

Once completed, we petitioned the city to change the name of the street to Veterans Memorial Drive. The City Council approved our request unanimously. BCRW maintains a wreath at the memorial that is changed monthly, and special wreaths are made for all major holidays.

For our May meeting we hosted the four Republican candidates for Assembly District 40 and the three Republican candidates vying for the non-partisan position of Carson City Mayor. Each candidate was given three minutes to present himself, followed by moderator Megan LoPresti asking each candidate within their race questions relating



to the position they are vying for. The questions were prepared by a committee of CCRW members. All candidates expressed themselves very well. Carson City voters have a well-spoken and prepared group of candidates to choose from.

Carson High School Senior Nora Streng, the winner of the CCRW 2016 \$2,000 scholarship was also present at our May meeting and given the opportunity to say a few words. She will receive \$500 each of her four years of schooling as she pursues a Bachelor of Science Degree in Engineering at the University of Nevada. The money will be dispersed directly to the University of Nevada.



The scholarship is offered to any high school senior girl living in the Carson City/Dayton area who would be attending a college, university or trade school in the fall. 


FLAG DAY - JUNE 14

Does the name Betsy Ross raise a flag for you? You will recall that she was a seamstress and a flag maker for the Pennsylvania Navy back in the 1700's. She is brought to mind just now because June 14th is America's Flag Day – the day set aside for Americans to appreciate the principles for which it stands. Flag Day also brings to mind the historic figure who authored one of the most cherished and patriotic tributes ever to sing the praises of the American Flag –Francis Scott Key.

At the outbreak of the "War of 1812," a humongous American flag waved from atop the flagpole over Fort McHenry. The British army detested that flag as an affront to the "Royal Crown" and ordered Fort McHenry to cease flying it – immediately. When the defenders of the fort defied that directive, an admiral commanding an armada of British warships unleashed a hellacious bombardment upon the fort that went on for twenty-five hours. Key was a prisoner on one of those ships and could see Fort McHenry from afar. When, finally, the British gunships fell silent in the night, he wondered if the flag had been brought down by the bombs. The next morning, "in the dawn's early light," he was beside himself with joy at the sight of the Stars and Stripes waving defiantly over Fort McHenry. That triumph consecrated the souls of the soldiers who gave their lives at the base of the flagpole to keep Ole Glory raised. Francis Scott Key was so moved that he seized his pen and captured the event in the words of "The Star-Spangled Banner."



The Star-Spangled Banner was born of the flag of Fort McHenry and the flag of Fort McHenry was born of The Star-Spangled Banner. They gave birth to each other. The massive bomb-damaged flag from the War of 1812 resides now in the archive of the Smithsonian National Museum. It is a treasure of American heritage that draws millions of visitors a year. The Star-Spangled Banner was eventually set to song and, on March 3, 1931, was designated to be the national anthem of the United States of America.

The years beneath my gray hair go to "way back when." Coming forward from then to now, I have noticed, year-after-year, that fewer and fewer Americans fly the Stars and Stripes on Flag Day. I have to confess that observing their disappearance is a troubling experience. But being the eternal optimist that I am, I'm hoping that this June 14th, the flags of Flag Day will go "viral" and paint America over with the colors" of our nation.

If you think the opinion here expressed is worth passing on, you are encouraged to pass it on.


